Actions:

Multiattack: The Boobrie makes two claw attacks.

Claw: Melee Weapon Attack: +6 to hit, reach 5 ft., one target. Hit: 10 (2d6 + 4) slashing damage.

Bite: Melee Weapon Attack: +6 to hit, reach 5 ft., one target. Hit: 12 (2d8 + 4) piercing damage.

Lure: The Boobrie can mimic any bird or animal call it has heard. Any creature within 60 ft. that can hear the call must make a DC 12 Wisdom saving throw or be drawn to the source of the call. The creature must move towards the Boobrie and use its action to move as close to the Boobrie as possible. The effect lasts for 1 minute or until the creature takes any damage.

Legendary Actions:

The Boobrie can take 3 legendary actions per turn, choosing from the options below:

- Attack: The Boobrie makes one claw attack.
- Move: The Boobrie moves up to its speed without provoking opportunity attacks.
- Lure: The Boobrie uses its Lure ability.
